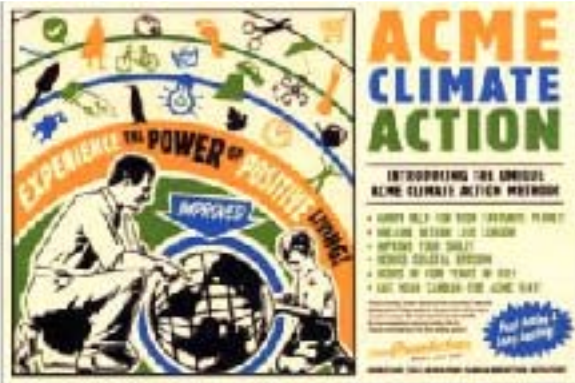

Developed in collaboration with teachers and students across seven countries, the toolkits (primary and secondary versions) have been tailored to each country's curriculum. They help to make sense of some of the big issues around climate change, understand what global interdependence means, think about our role in creating a fair and sustainable world and encourage responsible action.

10 things I can do to help my world. Walker Books, £9.99

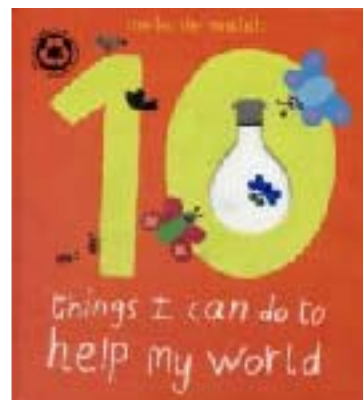
An innovative book for pre-school children, to show them how even the smallest actions can help to conserve the world's resources. Simple text, engaging illustrations and lift-the-flap pages.

Earthwise: Environmental crafts and activities with young children. Floris, £9.99

Earthwise is full of practical ideas for nature crafts and seasonal activities to encourage young children to be aware of their environment. The activities are carefully written and beautifully illustrated, and will encourage children to develop a respect for nature, the earth and all living creatures. Children will learn about their dependence on the earth's produce, how to create and not just consume, how to make butter and grow food (even in the city) and how to make outdoor playhouses from natural materials.
